




acob Harlan and his wife Kathrine have been living in Hunan, China for the last year along with their five-yearold son, Riley, and one-year-old daughter, Emma. Jacob founded China Horizons nearly seven years ago after returning from a year teaching experience with Kathrine. Having met in 2001 in Chinese class, of all places, they were married nearly a year later, and arrived in China about four weeks after that.

As English teachers, without support from any agency or even curriculum structure, the Harlans were initiated to Chinese culture by about 2,000 middle school students—a fun and very demanding challenge.

Jacob and Kathrine returned home to finish degrees in Business Management and Economics, respectively, and recognized that there was a growing interest in China and her people. China Horizons was born. Jacob has arranged teaching positions every semester since the fall of 2003. New groups of teachers arrive for the semester programs during August and February and during July for the short 2-3 week summer camps.

China Horizons has grown continually, and in the spring of 2009, the Harlans—now with two children—made plans to move to China in order to become more involved with the teachers and schools there. Jacob has frequent contact with CH teachers and their school leaders to ensure each teacher has the best possible experience. Living in China is a unique and enriching experience, difficult at times, but filled with learning, love, and making memories. Plus, the Harlans now get to meet all the teachers and hear their crazy stories! As a family in China during the last year, they've been able to visit many beautiful places, but their favorite destination (besides just living the simple life in Xiangtan) is a trip to Yangshuo to stay in the Bamboo House Hostel and float down the Yulong River in a bamboo raft.




